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## Planning the Lead

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You should lead your side's longest suit. This does not necessarily correspond to your own long suit.

Remember that the aim is to produce length tricks once the opponents run out of cards in the suit. Unless you and your partner have at least 7 , ideally 8 , cards in the suit between you, this is unlikely to happen.

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a: You have to lose 2 rounds of the suit before your fourth $\uparrow$ becomes a winner.

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: You have to lose 2 rounds of the suit before your fourth becomes a winner.
$\uparrow$ : You might lose 1 round if the $Q$ is on your left but will lose $\mathbf{0}$ rounds if it is on your right!

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In (a), you expect to gain the lead during the hand, which might give you time to establish your and then cash them.

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(b) K2 973 JT8642

In (a), you expect to gain the lead during the hand, which might give you time to establish your and then cash them.
In (b), you may or may not get in once more, at which point your are unlikely to be winners.

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The opponents have not looked for a major fit and you don't have length... It looks very likely that your partner has $\vee$ here!

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1NT - 3NT AP

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Lead a $\upharpoonright$ to establish your partner's suit.

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- AQ63 9852

If the $\vee \mathrm{K}$ is on your right, you would like P to play a $\vee$ through the $\vee \mathrm{K}$. A passive ${ }^{\text {might be better instead. }}$

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In (a), leading a $\vee$ and finding P with a key honour might be the only way of taking 3NT down when they often have a surplus of HCP.

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In (a), leading a $\vee$ and finding $P$ with a key honour might be the only way of taking 3NT down when they often have a surplus of HCP.
In (b), they have shakily bid to 3NT: if you make them work for it, they might end up going down; you don't want to give them their ninth trick!

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Can Partner's suit be strong or long enough to take the contract down?

Declarer plays the $\vee 2$.
The $\vee 4$ is the lowest possible spot: as fourth-highest, it must be from precisely 4 cards without a strong sequence: $\vee$ QJ54 at best.

With P’s $\upharpoonright J$, a $\vee$ seems to be right.

Playing a is more appealing when P might hold $\vee \mathrm{J} 854$.

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If you play the 4 on the first round, Declarer can block the suit by winning with the A straightaway!

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Do you need to unblock in the suit P led?

Unblock the K instead.

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Declarer has denied four $\uparrow$, so $P$ must have four!

Declarer has denied four $\wedge$, so $P$ must have four!
Switch to a $\boldsymbol{\wedge}$ : maybe $P$ didn’t want to lead one from $\uparrow$ AJTx.

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Has Partner bid a suit he didn't lead?

Declarer is the one with the stop: lead a through him!

In (a), $P$ cannot have any more HCP. Hoping for the $\vee J$ is futile and playing $\vee$ will help Decl. Play a passive 4 .

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In (a), $P$ cannot have any more HCP. Hoping for the $\vee J$ is futile and playing $\vee$ will help Decl. Play a passive 1 .
In (b), P could easily have the $\vee A$ or $\gtrdot J$. Switch to $a \vee!$

In (b), the contract might be going down as long as you don't give anything away. Return a passive $\downarrow$.
