- High denies any honours

▶ Does the Ten count as an honour?

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- If yes, lead the 3.

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- Does the Ten count as an honour? e.g. T853
- If yes, lead the 3.
- If no, lead the 8. (T would promise 9)

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- e.g. T8543 against NT but T is not an honour
- If yes, lead the 3.
- If no, lead the 8.
